Does Kuwait use oil to generate electricity?

Kuwait relies on oil and natural gas to generate electricity, with oil accounting for 64% of the generating capacity in 2015. Given Kuwait's dependence on oil-export revenues, there are significant financial incentives to move away from burning oil for domestic power use.

Who controls the oil sector in Kuwait?

The government of Kuwaitowns and controls all development of the oil sector. The Prime Minister heads the Supreme Petroleum Council (SPC), which oversees Kuwait's oil sector and sets oil policy. The other members of the council (six ministers and six representatives from the private sector) all serve three-year terms, and are selected by the Emir.
