Who owns power stations in Trinidad and Tobago?

On 24th December, 1994, T&TEC established a fully owned subsidiary, the Power Generation Company of Trinidad and Tobago (PowerGen) in which it vested the generation assets of its Port-of-Spain, Pt. Lisas and Penal power stations.

What is electricity generation in Trinidad & Tobago?

Electric Power Generation In Trinidad and Tobago (T&T), electricity generation primarily uses natural gas as the fuel source. The power generation technology used are simple cycle gas turbines and combined cycle gas turbines with heat recovery steam generators.

Who produces power in Trinidad & Tobago?

These producers are the Power Generation Company of Trinidad and Tobago (PowerGen) giving a total of 1,344 MW, Trinidad Generation Unlimited (TGU) giving 720 MW and Trinity Power Ltd. giving 225 MW. All power stations in Trinidad and Tobago are fueled by hydrocarbons. T&TEC was formed in 1946 after the merger of independent companies.

What is the largest power plant in Trinidad & Tobago?

The 720-megawatt (MW) TGU facility is the largest combined-cycle power generation plant in the Caribbean and currently supplies approximately 50% of Trinidad & Tobago's electrical energy.

In 1946, the Commission served 6,613 customers and operated one Power Station on Wrightson Road. Under Chairman Sir Errol dos Santos (1946 - 1949) and General Manager J.H.
